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In AYCE, youth & young adults...

→ are seen as valuable participants in the work of local government

→ are prepared and supported to tackle relevant issues

→ work in partnership with adults who respect, listen to and support them

AYCE = Positive outcomes

- 1 budget savings & revenue generation
- 2 increase support for city initiatives
- 3 better policy for healthy youth development
- 4 services are relevant& accessible

- 5 higher rates of voting & volunteerism in young adults
- 6 prepare current and future leaders
- 7 improve direct outcomes for youth

 Elected officials and other community leaders promote and act on their belief that youth can help local government build a better community.

The Support

What does it take?

Role

 Build youth adult partnerships to support engagement.

Outcome

Adults - within and outside of government – are willing and able to work as colleagues with youth and build bridges between them and the adult world.



Working with Young People

- Avoid preconceptions
- Orient young leaders (and adults!)
- Make meeting interactive
- Allow young people to lead
- Encourage youth peer networking
- Respect young people's needs
- Institutionalize youth involvement



The Structure



Role

 Develop an infrastructure that supports youth participation.

Outcome

A workable structure matches the interests of youth with the needs of the city.

- Research and Evaluation

Communication and Media

- Co-designing marketing materials

- Writing articles, blog posts or op-eds
- Serving as spokespeople

Organizing and Activism

- Organizing their peers to support community initiatives or policies
- Advocating on behalf of a wellness council at official meetings

Helpful Tips for Adult Leaders

- 1. Be clear about roles and expectations
- 2. Create more than one youth position
- 3. Provide skill-building opportunities beyond the meetings
- 4. Prioritize youth in any action plans
- 5. Invite youth to cultivate leadership amongst their peers
- 6. Meet at convenient times and locations

How to Create a Youth-Led Board

STAGE 1: Assess your city, agency or organizations readiness to work with young people.

- What is your purpose?
- How will you actually support the youth?
- Identify key staff and build support from the entire organization

STAGE 2: Recruit and orient board members

- Outreach and recruitment
- Application process
- Letters of recommendation
- Interviews

STAGE 3: Support and sustain the board with activities

- Provide skill-building opportunities
- Provide coaching and support
- Provide meeting space and logistics
- Provide clear communication
